2024 / 2025 Chairperson's Report



Kia ora,

I am pleased to report another year of continuing progress and good outcomes.

The group delivered a net surplus of \$2.5m from Revenues of \$83m. Total assets increased by \$2.5m with total equity now \$57.5m

Across our 4 regions, we support 360 people in residence and 60 in non resident day services. Those that we support across NZ live meaningful lives in our Children's, Rangitahi, Adult and Elder communities.

Our work and future direction is aligned to our Vision of 'every life fully lived', our Mission of 'supportive communities inspired by anthroposophy which celebrate the diverse ways of being human' and our Values of 'Whakamana' and 'Sustainability'

We are committed to the wellbeing of those we support with healthy and safe homes, the Hōhepa School, the worth of work, participation in the community, programmes for learning and development, recreational pursuits, festivals, the arts in all of its forms and the pursuit of happiness.

Our General Managers ensure high levels of communication with families, staff and key stakeholders. Thank you for your regional leadership. Thank you to all of our management teams and staff for your commitment to our work. Success rewards effort and you should all be very proud.

Regional highlights and strategic initiatives are many.

In Auckland, We have made steady progress with our building programme. Two new 5 bedroom homes are nearing completion. Our property plan includes continuing improvements and potential for further property acquisition. Community programmes, festivals and stakeholder engagement are all highlights.

Our Hawkes Bay community is strong and accomplished. The exit of residential services from Clive is continuing with delivery of significant new infrastructure and homes at Poraiti and a new property acquisition in Taradale. Community life, social enterprises, festivals, education, Rangitahi, Adult services and elder care are empowered by a healthy culture.

Wellington continues to make progress with a growing number of people we support. Our management and staff are very focused on striving for excellence in service delivery. Our plan for new infrastructure and landscaping at our Otaihangā site continues. Development of work programmes and utilisation of the natural attributes of this site is ongoing.

In Canterbury, we have continued to refine our service delivery programmes. Our management and staff have worked hard to meet stakeholder expectations and to meet targets. Plans for renovations and new home builds have been approved for the next 3 years. Community life is active and rewarding.

Across NZ, volunteers made a significant contribution with diversity of experience and life skills.

This year has seen change in Government contract systems. This presented an opportunity to reflect on efficiencies and outcomes. We are grateful to Government for continuity of funding.

We thank our Regional Board members for their work and dedication. At the Trust Board, we welcomed two new Trustees and Directors. Ed Eadie was appointed Chair of the Auckland Regional Board and Nalini Meyer Chair of the Canterbury Regional Board. We are delighted to have them at the Trust Board, bringing professional skills and new perspectives.

The commitment of our Trustees and Directors to the oversight of all of the Trusts activities and to the success and sustainability of our mission is acknowledged with gratitude.

To the families, friends and all of the funders of Hōhepa we thank you sincerely for your support and encouragement.

Finally, to those that we support, it is a privilege to be a part of your lives and wellbeing.


National Governance Hui


- More room, more opportunities, more support spaces

Hōhepa Canterbury

It has been a uniquely challenging year for Hōhepa Canterbury, with a number of unforeseen events creating impetus to reflect on our plans, re-prioritise and make some significant change. It has been an impactful year, simply not in the way we imagined.

In particular I want to acknowledge the under-recognised mahi of our direct support staff. A key unanticipated event was the cancellation of Pay Equity claims, including those to improve remuneration for these roles. Our direct support staff often work in challenging circumstances, caretaking important life rhythms with the impetus to enable people to identify and pursue the things that have meaning and purpose for them. This is the most impactful role at Hōhepa and I am grateful for the work our direct support staff do each day.

Our administrators, managers and leaders also rise to the challenges of their roles. These are varied across a number of disciplines and yet each team continues to bring forward initiatives to improve Hōhepa and make the mahi safer and easier to do.



The members of this team have done well to look to the horizon, anticipate issues and make suggestions to correct the course that means we have landed in a strong place at the end of a complex year.

Whānau continue to be supportive of our mahi and we value the input and partnerships being created. We are stronger together and we look forward to further strengthening this in the coming year.



Hōhepa Wellington

2025 has been a challenging year with positive results, made possible by the resilience, creativity, and commitment of our workforce. Working in a shifting landscape, keeping us vigilant in honouring our commitment to our service vision as it related to Hōhepa and our wider community.

And yet, we head toward the end of this year with a sense of momentum. We are heartened by the progress we have made and energised by the opportunities ahead. Over the year, we have launched new initiatives, strengthened staff capability, and taken meaningful steps toward transforming our sites in ways that are sustainable, inclusive, and mana-enhancing.

KEY ACCOMPLISHMENTS: FUNDRAISING

This year marked our formal launch into fundraising. From our highly successful inaugural Golf Day to a growing culture of strategic grant applications and individual giving, we have begun to build a foundation that will assist us into the future.

Thanks to these efforts, we welcomed:

- A new electric vehicle into our fleet—an investment in both service and sustainability.
- Secured funding to develop our vision of a community garden that will nourish both our bodies as well as our relationships.
- A generous proportion of money toward the establishment of a stand-alone sensory room, an opportunity to make further offerings to the wider disability community.

These wins reflect more than financial success—they show the power of community, storytelling, and shared belief in our Kaupapa.

BUILDING STAFF COMPETENCY

Our people are our greatest taonga, and this year started a journey to strength our responses to mahi we do. Highlights include:

- A six-session leadership training programme for house managers, fostering confidence, clarity, and connection.
- An organisational development session that helped us reflect and understand organisation growth – where we have been and where we are headed.



- A roles and responsibilities workshop that clarified expectations across service delivery.

- The starting blocks of a competency framework across the distinct roles, to support a career development pathway and self-reflection.

- The creation of a comprehensive 13-week orientation programme for support workers, ensuring every new team member is welcomed, informed, and prepared to uphold the health and safety of those we support.



These initiatives are shaping a culture of excellence, consistency, and care - where every staff member feels confident and equipped to carry out the responsibilities attached to their role.

SITE DEVELOPMENT

We are privileged to steward the whenua we occupy, and this year we have taken important steps toward phase 1 of our site development programme of work.

Phase 1 of our site development journey is underway, carefully balanced between the generosity of key donors and the imperative to move forward. We have held fast to our commitment to creating spaces that uplift, connect, and endure.

COMMUNITY CONNECTION

In July we secured new funding from the Ministry of Social Development to expand and enrich the range of activities and opportunities we offer. This support will enable us to deepen the experiences we offer, create stronger community connections, and explore inclusive pathways for new experiences. A new Engagement Facilitator has been recruited to lead this work - designing opportunities for the people we support that uplift, connect, and grow.

This year has asked much of us. It has stretched our capacity, tested our systems, and reminded us of the importance of clear vision and collective effort. And yet, through it all, we have emerged stronger and look forward to what the next year brings.
